Course Description: *First of three courses in the mathematics cluster for prospective elementary and middle school teachers.* Develops the understanding of basic mathematical concepts necessary for teaching mathematics in grades K-8. Topics include problem solving, whole numbers, algorithms for computation, numeration systems, number theory and fractions.

Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Solve mathematical problems using multiple approaches.
2. Solve problems and explain mathematical concepts using manipulatives.
3. Explain and apply multiple methods for arithmetic computations with fractions, whole numbers and numbers in different bases.
4. Communicate mathematical concepts and algorithms in a variety of ways: written, verbal, or by demonstration.

Presentation:

You will be assigned a topic to present. The presentations will be submitted/presented during week 10. I will give you more information about the presentations and about how they are graded when they are assigned. You will be designing a virtual lesson over one specific question related to our content. These will be presented by video (unless you prefer to do a live lesson).

Activities:

We will be doing lots of activities. These are intended to be done in a group setting - not independently. I intend to use class time with breakout rooms to help you manage your activity. You will need to have your Student Activity Manual available. You will be responding to specific questions via FORUM discussion on moodle. Each student will also be required to respond to one other student's post not in their group. I like to change groups around so everyone interacts. If anyone in your group appears difficult to work with, please let me know.

Tests:

There are two tests (midterm & final) in this class. Dates and particulars will be available soon. The final will be partially comprehensive, with a greater emphasis on the material covered since the second test. There will be no makeups. However, you may use the percentage grade on the final exam to replace the midterm grade up to a maximum replacement score of 70%. You should make every effort to contact me **before** the scheduled test time if there is any possibility that you may miss a test for an unavoidable reason. There are no make-ups for the final exam.

HELP: If you have questions, PLEASE come to office hours or message me and ask! I have scheduled office hours but you're welcome to schedule other times with me too. Additionally, the [Learning Center](#) provides a [Math Help Desk](#)—a place you can “drop in” and receive assistance with your math questions. Study groups are encouraged! Many students find that working with classmates is the best way to learn and understand the material. I will do my best to keep all these resources updated on my moodle page.

Expectations: I expect that my students will be involved in class. This includes being present, asking questions and participating in discussions. You should be prepared for class and appropriate in dress and manners (this
