Course Description: An introduction to the study of psychological disorders, including issues of diagnosis and treatment. Topics include: models of abnormality; overview of major disorders, including diagnostic considerations; current research on treatment effectiveness; and the impact of psychological disorders on society and its legal system.

There are no prerequisites for this course, however, placement at or above the ALS 115 Advanced College Reading and Learning Strategies and WR 115 Introduction to College Writing levels are highly recommended for success in this course.

Course Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Describe major facts and theories from the domain of abnormal psychology.
- Recognize and articulate the interplay between social, psychological and biological forces as it applies to abnormal psychology.
- Apply relevant phenomena from abnormal psychology to everyday relationships and situations.
- Combine and synthesize concepts and theories from abnormal psychology to draw reasonable conclusions, develop intelligent skepticism, and critically analyze information

Welcome *PSY219 Introduction to Abnormal Psychology*. In this class, there will be some lecture, discussions, and class activities which involve working in small groups or pairs. These experiences will provide an opportunity for you to reflect on your reading and your everyday life and are designed to contribute to the learning process.

Attendance: This is a lecture, small group and student participation class. Attendance is important. Participation activity points are given for in-class activities. If you miss a class, do not contact me. Connect with fellow students to get the information that you need.

Email: Use your LBCC email account to communicate with me. When you email me, it is important that you identify your full name and the course that you are attending. I will not respond to emails without this information.

In the classroom... *It is important that all students feel welcome in class and comfortable asking questions and sharing their ideas during discussions and activities. Often there will be differing opinions, perspectives and experiences. To facilitate meaningful discussions, it is important to respect and honor each other, to listen graciously when others are speaking, and to agree to disagree in a respectful manner.*

Course Requirements

Your final grade will be determined by your performance on the following:

Assignments: There are two assignments. Each assignment must be typed, double spaced and be about 1 page in length. It must be printed out and turned in at the beginning of class on the day that it is due. Assignments may not be turned in via email. Be certain to keep a copy of your assignment. Each assignment consists of short answer questions which are designed to provide an opportunity for you to build your personal understanding of psychology.

Quizzes (take home): There are 2 take home quizzes. Each quiz will be handed out in class one week before it is due. Quizzes must be turned in at the beginning of class on the day that they are due. You may turn in a quiz early. Quizzes primarily cover your reading in the textbook. Items for each quiz include multiple choice, true/false and matching questions.

Class Activity participation: Receive points for participation during in-class activities and discussion. Ten class dates will be selected to earn participation points. I will announce eligible class dates at the beginning of the qualifying class period.

Exams Exam 1 will be given at the beginning of class on Tuesday, February 12th. Exam 1 covers weeks 1-5 lecture material, in-class activities, discussions, videos, and text chapters (chapters 1-5). Exam 2 will be given on Tuesday, March 20 at 4:30pm. Exam 2 covers weeks 6-10 lecture material, in-class activities, discussions, videos, and text chapters (chapters 6, 7, 12, 16). Items consist of multiple choice, true/false and matching questions.

Grades are figured on straight percentage based on the total number of points possible.
