Course Description

NUR 101B is the first course in the lab series. Applies theory from the didactic portion of the curriculum to clinical practice. Focuses on the application of the fundamental principles of health and illness, infection prevention and control, pain, nutrition, elimination, sleep/rest, mobility, mental health, fluid and electrolytes and evidenced-based practice to clinical practice. Engages students in legal-ethical principles in documentation, confidentiality, and communication. Develops abilities in select nursing skills and physical assessment in the lab k simulation and clinical settings.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Management of Care: Uses evidence-based research to plan care and develop a nursing care plan with one diagnosis.
- Safety and Infection Control: Protect client from injury and apply principles of infection control.
- Health Promotion and Maintenance: Reinforce basic health promotion and self-care education to patients.
- Psychosocial Integrity: Demonstrate therapeutic nurse-patient relationship to meet patients needs.
- Basic Care and Comfort: Perform and demonstrate the basic Registered Nurse functions to promote care and comfort.
- Pharmacological and Parenteral Therapies: Demonstrate knowledge of oral medication administration and prepare oral medications in a simulated care setting.
- Reduction of Risk Potential: Perform screening tests and identify appropriate interventions.
- Physiological Adaptation: Apply beginning pathological, physiological, and behavioral science concepts to the care of one patient and performs a timed, comprehensive physical assessment in the simulated care setting.
- Professional Engagement: Identify the nursing student role in a healthcare setting and participates in reflective practice.

Grading

Evaluation of learning which results in a grade for the course will be determined by clinical performance which is a combination of performance and participation in clinical activities, Skill/Simulation and IPE. Clinical performance is on a PASS / NO PASS basis. Attendance and participation in all clinical experience is critical to student success. Components of determining the grade include all areas of the clinical evaluation tool. Students should be advised that this also includes participation in all skills/simulation curriculum and the completion of all assigned materials and exercises. Of special note are the following areas which apply to all clinical settings:

- A. Practices within the parameters of skill competency and knowledge level in the setting.
- B. Evaluates personal clinical performance and modifies his/her nursing practice accordingly in the setting.
- C. Seeks feedback and assistance appropriately and incorporates feedback to improve performance in the setting.

Clinical performance is evaluated at the end of the term. Clinical instructors are permitted to evaluate student performance as frequently as necessary to determine achievement of course outcomes.

Students must pass NUR268A, NUR101A and NUR101B courses concurrently in order to progress to the next sequence of the program.

Skills / Simulation Lab performance is evaluated as part of the clinical experience. Participation in this learning environment is mandatory and may require preparatory

activities above those assigned to the other members of the course on the assigned weeks. Absences will be tracked on the [LBCC Attendance and Participation Tool](#), absences may require students to complete make-up clinical shifts. Students are to acquire new skills and have their individual performance validated as correct. Students may be mandated to make-up skills/simulation time prior to continuing on to the off-campus clinical experience. Student may also be mandated to remediation and/or a traditional “check-off” experience in order to determine progression. The lab areas are considered as clinical areas and students are to wear clinical attire when participating in assigned instructional time in those areas. Students should review the Uniform Policy.

Physical Assessment Performance Demonstration is a critical component of the clinical experience in this course. Student will be expected to demonstrate a comprehensive head-to-toe physical assessment on an assigned fellow student-"client". This demonstration will take place prior to Friday of week 10 of the term as scheduled by the assigned instructor. Students are expected to perform the exam from memory using appropriate techniques and communicating effectively to the "client". Performance is evaluated using a standardized rubric, available on the NUR101B moodle site. Student must score 75% of the total points available on the corresponding rubric to pass the course.
