#### **Course Description**

PSY201 - General Psychology is an introduction to several of the different sub-fields and methods of study in psychology. You should leave this course with an understanding of the biological and cognitive aspects of psychology, including history, methodology, biological foundations of behavior, human development, sensation, perception, learning, memory, language and problem-solving.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

As a result of successfully completing this course, you should be able to:

- Describe major facts and theories from the domain of psychology.
- Recognize and articulate the interplay between social, psychological and biological forces.
- Apply relevant psychological phenomena to everyday relationships and situations.
- Combine and synthesize psychological concepts and theories to draw reasonable conclusions, develop intelligent skepticism, and critically analyze information.

## **Course Requirements**

Your final grade in this class will be determined by your performance on the following:

<u>Quizzes</u>: There will be 6 quizzes over the course of the term. They will be worth 25% of your total grade. The quizzes will consist of 30 multiple-choice questions and you will be allowed 30 minutes to take them. To allow for instances in which you are unable to take the quiz, I will only include your 5 highest scores in the determination of your final grade. If you take all 6 quizzes, you will be allowed to drop your lowest quiz score. **Quizzes will be taken on-line at the Moodle site for this course.** You will usually have 2-3 days to take each quiz and may do so from any computer both on and off campus, which should eliminate timing problems and the possibility of missing a quiz. See the *Email Policy* instructions on what to do if you experience computer issues while taking or submitting a Moodle quiz.

<u>Exams</u>: There will be 3 regular exams worth over the course of the term. Each exam will be **comprehensive** on the information we have covered to the date of each exam (see course outline for details) and they will consist of multiple-choice, matching, identification, short-answer and essay questions. In addition, each exam will vary according to weight: Exam 1 will be worth 10%, Exam 2 will be worth 15% and Exam 3 will be worth 20% towards your final grade (this means that the 3 exams are worth 60% of your total grade). **All regular exams will be taken in class during class time on the date indicated in the course outline.** To allow for instances in which you are unable to take a regular exam during the allotted time, the final exam will be used as a makeup exam (see below).

<u>Final Exam</u>: There will be one optional **comprehensive** final exam following the same format as the regular exams and given during final exams week (see course outline and/or final exam schedule on the LBCC website). If you miss a regular exam due to illness or unforeseen circumstance, the final exam will replace the missing score. If you have taken all the regular exams, the final exam can be used to replace a low exam score OR you can opt out of the final exam if you have taken all three regular exams and are happy with your grade.

Research Consumer Paper II: You will have one paper worth 15% of your grade due this term. The purpose of this assignment is to help you learn to evaluate and communicate about research and to be a good consumer of research. Details of the paper are available on the Moodle site and it is due by 11:55 p.m. on the date indicated on the course outline. To allow for unforeseen circumstances, you can turn in this paper up to 14 days late for 80% of the total points available. NO PAPERS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER FEBRUARY 8TH!!

<u>Activities</u>: We will also be conducting 10 online activities worth 8% of your final grade over the course of the term. Activities will be done online at the LaunchPad website for your textbook. You will need the access code that came with your textbook to gain access to this site. To allow for unforeseen circumstances in which you were unable to complete an activity by the deadline, only 8 of the 10 activities count toward the determination of your final grade.

<u>Daily Quizzes and Participation</u>: In addition to online activities, I will be giving daily quizzes and participation points during **almost** every class starting the 2nd day of the 1st week of classes. For the most part, these points will consist of 5 multiple-choice questions (covering information from the previous lecture), given during the 1st 5 minutes of class and answered using your smart device (phone, tablet or laptop). There will also be an exit ticket that your group will fill out at the end of each class. If you are not present for BOTH of these, you will not get full credit. However, I reserve the right to assign these points as I see fit. For example, at times, I may assign them to an activity we do in class. Daily quizzes will be worth 7% of your final grade. To allow for unforeseen absences, you will be allowed to drop your 3 lowest daily quiz scores from your final grade.

<u>Grades</u>: Your final grade will be assigned based on the total number of points earned during the course and the weight of each of the assignments. You will be assigned to the letter grade corresponding to your % of total points according to the table below:

<u>Moodle</u>: All students who are on the class roster will be enrolled in the Moodle site for this course during the 1st week of classes. You will take all your quizzes on Moodle in addition to accessing your grades, topic outlines, study guides, internet links and handouts.

<u>LaunchPad</u> All activities will be completed at the LaunchPad website for the textbook required for this course. Another student is your **best** resource for notes and class information. If you will be gone for an extended period due to an unavoidable circumstance, **please** make an appointment with me so we can discuss your options.

You are not to use your cell phones to do anything but answering Socrative questions during class.
