Welcome to COMM218: Interpersonal Communication. I hope that you can benefit from this course related to your own interpersonal relationships, regardless be they face-to-face or online. Below you will find the syllabus for the course. Please read through it CAREFULLY, paying special attention to assignment deadlines. A calendar with *ALL* assignment due dates for the ENTIRE TERM is included, so late assignments are not accepted.

We will focus on the development of interpersonal communication knowledge and the improvement of interpersonal communication skills, both in the context of face-to-face and online relationships. We will move toward these goals by exploring various aspects of theory and practical skill development in the interpersonal communication process. The various aspects of interpersonal communication which we will explore include the communication process, self- concept, perception, emotions, language, nonverbal communication, listening, relationship development, communication climates and conflict resolution. Exploration of these topics will involve readings, in-class discussions, group activities, video clips, written assignments, presentations, quizzes, and exams.

Success in this course is largely dependent upon your willingness to be an active participant. Additionally, students who successfully complete this course are willing and able to use the technology necessary to access web information, down/upload assignments, and communicate. You must also be a self-disciplined, independent learner with college level reading and writing skills. Completion of WR121 AND RD90 is <u>STRONGLY</u> recommended. Students who successfully complete this course should be able to:

- Apply interpersonal communication research and theory.
- Identify interpersonal communication's key functional areas.
- Analyze, select, and enact appropriate interpersonal communication behaviors based on context interpretation.

ACTIVITIES/HOMEWORK: Each week there will be a variety of small group activities/homework assignments covering the concepts we are discussing in the lecture that week. You must be on time to class and present for the entire class period (all 80 minutes) to complete and submit these assignments. All assignments will be submitted via Moodle. Make up activities will not be offered for activities missed due to an unexcused absence. "In – class activities" will be completed on Tuesdays during regular class time via Zoom on Moodle and homework assignments will be due Fridays by 11:59pm via submission to Moodle. See calendar below for more information. The "homework" assignments are what you use to complete the "Example Sharing" assignment (see below).

ATTENDANCE: Your attendance is based on your presence/participation in class. Attendance will be taken based on those present in Tuesdays weekly Zoom meetings during the first 10 minutes of class. You are allowed two (2) unexcused absences for the term, not including technical difficulties. Additionally, you must arrive on time and be present for the full class. For every unexcused absence after two (2) your *FINAL COURSE GRADE* will be lowered by 1/3. If you are going to be gone for a university sanctioned event, documentation needs to be submitted PRIOR to being gone for the absence to be excused. Documentation after the fact will not be accepted.

HOMEWORK EXAMPLE SHARING: Based on the first letter of your last name, you will record yourself sharing and explaining 3 examples from the homework assignment for that week and upload it to Moodle. You ONLY complete this assignment once during the term. Please look at the calendar below for when you are scheduled to share your examples. If you miss sharing your examples and it is an unexcused absence, you will not be allowed to make up the assignment.

FILM PRESENTATION: Throughout the term, we watch clips from shows and films that demonstrate interpersonal concepts. This presentation will require you to select a film or show and identify/explain examples of course concepts in the film/show. You will present your analysis in a group presentation during week 10.

EXAMS: Week 4 and Finals week there will be an exam covering the materials presented from the previous week's lectures. Exams will be multiple choice, matching, and short answer. Exams will NOT be cumulative. A study guide will be provided before each of the exams, available on Moodle.

DEADLINES: All homework assignments are due via Moodle on Fridays by 11:59pm. The one-time "Sharing Examples" assignment is due based on the first letter of your last name (see below). After the due dates, assignments are late and not accepted. If you miss a deadline, it is NOT acceptable to simply email an assignment.

24 HOUR POLICY: Once graded work is handed back you must wait 24 hours before asking questions about the grade you earned. Comments are written on all graded work, so please take the time to read the comments before asking questions as many times the questions that arise are answered in the comments.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS: For all assignments they must be typed, double – spaced, and proofread. Use of conventional spelling, complete sentences, and a formal approach is required, meaning "text" language, emojis, or abbreviations are not appropriate.

TECHNOLOGY: I ask that during our Tuesday meetings, you adhere to a few policies:

- Present yourself as you would as if you were attending class on campus in both appearance and engagement;
 come prepared to interact with your classmates.
