HIS IS A SURVEY COURSE in mathematics for students in the liberal arts and other non-science majors. Topics are selected from areas such as critical thinking, analysis of growth, personal finance, probability, and statistics. During the term, students will learn to recognize and express mathematical ideas graphically, numerically, symbolically, and in writing. Application problems are realistic with some data to be collected, analyzed, and discussed in a group setting. Credits: 4; Prerequisite: MTH 095 or MTH 098.

- 1. Formulate questions that can be addressed with data
- 2. Demonstrate numeric and algebraic reasoning skills to support statistical analysis and financial literacy
- 3. Communicate mathematical concepts, processes, and solutions
- 4. Become a discriminating observer of quantitative information

Projects

I will assign three projects during the term. You choose which *two* you want to turn in for credit. These projects will require you to explore an open-ended math problem and write up the result in a short (one page) paper.

Expectations

I expect that my students will be involved in class. This includes being present, asking questions and participating in discussions and group work (the instructor notes excellent attendance/ attitude and will sometimes "bump up" a borderline grade for such students).

You should come to class prepared (this means you should bring your notebook, tablet/laptop, etc. in addition to having your work with you). Spend at least 8 hours per week working on this class.

I expect you will be respectful of everyone in the class, in word as well as behavior. Along these lines, I ask that you turn off and/or put away your cell phone, mp3 player, laptop, etc. during class—unless it is being used for an activity—so as to avoid causing a distraction.
