Emphasis is placed on enhancing personal and professional relationships by expanding knowledge, increasing understanding and developing practical skills necessary for competent communication.

Assignment Details: This list provides and overview of assignments. Due dates and points may be adjusted if need be. More information for each assignment will be handed out in-class.

- Homework/Journals (35 points; 5 points each)- There will be seven random participation assignments throughout the course of the semester. These points cannot be made up and may not be turned in late. Assignments may include (but are not limited to) homework worksheets, reflection journals, reading questions, etc. While I am not a fan of pop-quizzes, I'm not against "surprising" you with one if it looks like the class isn't doing the assigned readings.
- Celebrations of Learning (60 points; 30 points each)- While some people like to call these "exams" or "tests", I prefer to call them "Celebrations of Learning"! This course has two "Celebrations" throughout the semester. Material covered will come both from your textbook and class discussions/activities. HINT: If you do not read the text, you will not do well during the "Celebration".

- "What do you carry with you?" Presentation (20 points)- This assignment is designed to help you examine and explore the many dimensions of yourself. Fill a bag/backpack/purse with objects that are representative of how you view yourself. Objects should illustrate major life events, personal goals, challenges you've faced, successes you've achieved, and/or individual values that have impacted your life and made you who you are. Your objects should help us get to know you on a deeper level. Additionally, you will turn in a typed list of every object in your "backpack" with a description of how they influenced/shaped you.
- Breaking Social Norms Essay (25 points)- This assignment will show your
 understanding of interpersonal concepts, especially verbal/nonverbal concepts, by
 recognizing and explaining the socialized "norms" of everyday life. You will be required
 to step out your "traditional" comfort zone and explore why we may do the things we
 do.
- Cultural Experience Presentation (25 points)- The purpose of this assignment is to help strengthen your interpersonal interactions by exploring a culture different than your own. As we will discuss in class, culture has a major impact on our interpersonal behaviors and interactions as well as how we interpret and assign meaning to the behaviors of others. You will have a "cultural experience" and present the findings in class as it relates to interpersonal communication concepts. We will brainstorm ideas for cultural experiences in class. While you may go to the experience with a partner from class, you must have separate presentations.
- Cultural Experience: Individual Reflection Essay (25 points)- In this assignment, you will show your understanding of the content of this course by reflecting on your cultural experience and how it relates to interpersonal communication concepts. Essays will be graded based on how you are able to synthesize the concepts discussed in class with a reflection of your cultural experience.

Grading:

Grades will be assigned based upon points earned in all assignments:

After I return your assignment, you have one week to discuss a grade with me. I will not discuss grades after the one week deadline. I will not discuss grades via email or during class. If you would like to discuss your grade, please come talk to me during scheduled office hours or by setting up an appointment with me. There is absolutely no rounding up in this course.

COURSE POLICIES & PROCEDURES

Late Work:

All assignments are to be turned in on time. Late assignments will not be accepted.

Attendance:

Due to the interactive nature of this course, attendance is critical for your success and understanding of content. Therefore, students are allowed to miss only three days of class. Thereafter, your final grade will be lowered by five points for each day you miss class without a valid, documented excuse (must be approved by me—vacation, sleeping in, etc. are not valid excuses). Additionally, keep in mind there will be seven random homework/journal assignments throughout the term. These assignments make up the 35 points of your grade. It is up to you whether you attend class, however, be aware that if you miss an in-class assignment, **these points cannot be made up.**

Tardiness: If you are tardy by over 15 minutes, **you will be marked as absent**. If you leave class early, you will be marked as absent for the day.

Cell/Media Phone Policy: While internet and cell phone access have become a regular part of our culture, I expect you to silence your mobile devices during the duration of class out of respect for myself and your classmates. If you are expecting an urgent phone call/text, please notify me before class and excuse yourself from the room when responding. If I have to remind you to put away your phone more than once in a class period, you will be asked to leave and counted as absent.

Classroom Culture: In order to explore interpersonal communication concepts, it is crucial to be open to sharing your experiences and listening to the experiences of others. With my background and passion for civic engagement and diversity, I will most likely also encourage you to engage in dialogue around relevant social justice issues impacting our communities as it pertains to the course topics. The beauty of our country is that we are each allowed to have and share our opinions and viewpoints. That being said, I expect us to form a community of respect within our classroom. Healthy disagreement and discussion are a central component of this class and is encouraged, but must be done on a professional and constructive basis. While I have never experienced this in all my years of teaching, if you are disrespectful to your class members, you will be given a warning and then asked to leave.

Communication and office hours: Though surprising to some students, I do have a life outside of this class. While I check email often, after 5:00pm M-F and during weekends are times I set aside for my family. If you respond to me after 5:00pm M-F or on the weekends, do not expect a response until the next business day. While the best way to get ahold of me is typically email, I thoroughly enjoy when students stop by my office. Students that do best in my class tend to be the ones that come to my office hours. If my office hours do not work with your schedule, please let me know and I will try my best to meet with you at a different time.
