Course Description:

This course introduces students to various aspects of the communication process in one-to-one relationships. Emphasis is placed on enhancing personal and professional relationships by expanding knowledge, increasing understanding and developing practical skills necessary for competent communication.

Policies:

Contacting the Instructor: If you need to contact me for any reason, please use your LBCC provided email. I will still reply to you if you use a non-LBCC email, but I will not send any grading or performance information. I will reply to your emails within 24 hours Monday through Thursday. I may take longer to reply during weekends or holidays.

Assignments: All class assignments completed outside of class (homework) must be typed. If an assignment is not typed, it will be handed back and considered late. Take-home assignments will be submitted in class, at the beginning of the class.

Class Etiquette: Show respect for your fellow class members by being an active listener. We will create a supportive and inclusive environment for our peers. This means that class members will treat one another with respect and offer positive verbal and nonverbal feedback to their peers. Remember to turn off any electronic devices such as cell phones. Failure to comply with these guidelines will result in a warning for the first offense. The second offense will result in being marked absent for that day.

Attendance: Attendance is mandatory and worth 50 points. This course relies on your in-class participation. Repeated absences will lower your grade. If you miss more than one class without instructor approval over the course of the term, you will receive half credit for attendance. If you miss more than three classes, you will receive just 10 points. Arriving significantly late (30 or more minutes after class has started) may count as an absence. If you are repeatedly late, the instructor holds the right to start marking you absent. This policy does not require the instructor to contact you ahead of time.

In the event you do miss a class, it is your responsibility to find out what was covered in that class by talking with a classmate.

Participation: Your participation in this course is absolutely required because this is a shared learning environment. I will rely on your input, questions and comments in order to explore topics. This means that you will read the assigned chapters, ask questions, make comments, listen and provide constructive feedback to others while demonstrating enthusiasm for the material.

Plagiarism and Cheating: One definition of academic plagiarism is: “the intentional submission for evaluation to a college instructor or administrator of material based, in significant part, on work done by someone other than the submitter without reasonable written indication to the evaluator of the material’s true source.” Academic cheating is defined as “the intentional submission for evaluation to a college instructor or administrator of material based, in part, on a source or sources forbidden by generally accepted standards or by regulation established by the evaluator and disclosed in a reasonable manner.” The bottom line is that if you plagiarize or cheat, you will fail my class and face other serious consequences.

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Late Work: Written assignments will be penalized by 10% for each day after the due date up to one week. All work is due at the beginning of a session and is considered late once that class begins. You cannot make up group work or in-class assignments.

Tolerance: In this class there may be times when you disagree with opinions being expressed. It is important that you respond to these opinions in an appropriate, respectful and professional manner. Healthy disagreement and discussion are a central component of this class and is encouraged, but must be done so on a professional and constructive basis.

Special Needs: Individuals requiring accommodation due to a documented disability and/or personal hardship should meet with me during the first week of class. I will do my best to assist you, provided that it does not compromise the academic integrity of LBCC. Journal: You will be given topics related to interpersonal communication upon which to reflect and apply throughout the quarter. Topics will be based on concepts and theories that we discuss in class. The purpose of this assignment is for you to develop your ability to apply what you learn in class to your life outside of our classroom. I am looking for stories and examples that show application of topics. If it is unclear that the topic has been addressed or if examples are vague, points will be deducted. Each journal entry must be one to 1½ pages long, typed, double-spaced and written in 12-point, Times New Roman font with one-inch margins on all sides. Please label the number of your journal entry on the top left hand corner of the page. Points will be deducted for poor grammar.
