## **Course Description**

Social psychology studies the social nature of human behaviors, attitudes, perceptions, thoughts and emotions. Major areas of study include: research methods, social perception and judgment, attitude formation and change, prejudice, discrimination, sexism, aggression, interpersonal attraction altruism, conformity, group dynamics, and the application of social psychology findings to current social issues.

## **Course Learning Outcomes**

As a result of successfully completing this course, you should be able to:

- Describe major facts and theories from the domain of social psychology.
- Recognize and articulate the interplay between social, psychological, and biological forces as it applies to social psychology.
- Apply relevant social psychological phenomena to everyday relationships and situations.
- Combine and synthesize social psychological concepts and theories to draw reasonable conclusions, develop intelligent skepticism, and critically analyze information.

## **Course Requirements**

Your final grade in this class will be determined by your performance on the following:

Quizzes: There will be 6 quizzes over the course of the term. They will be worth 20% of your total grade. The quizzes will consist of 30 multiple-choice questions and you will be allowed 30 minutes to take them. To allow for instances in which you are unable to take the quiz, I will only include your 5 highest scores in the determination of your final grade. If you take all 6 quizzes, you will be allowed to drop your lowest quiz score. Quizzes will be taken on-line at the Canvas site for this course. You will usually have 2-3 days to take each quiz and may do so from any computer both on and off campus, which should eliminate timing problems and the possibility of missing a quiz. If you miss more than one quiz, the percentage for that quiz and any subsequent missed quizzes will be added the the weight of your final exam. If you have problems while taking or submitting a Canvas quiz, email me immediately and I will reset it for you.

<u>Exams</u>: There will be 3 regular exams worth over the course of the term. Each exam will be **comprehensive** on the information we have covered to the date of each exam (see course outline for details) and they will consist of multiple-choice, matching, identification, short-answer and essay questions. In addition, each exam will vary according to weight: Exam 1 will be worth 10%, Exam 2 will be worth 15% and Exam 3 will be worth 20% towards your final grade (this means that the 3 exams are worth 45% of your total grade). **All regular exams will be taken in class during class time on the date indicated in the course outline.** To allow for instances in which you are unable to take a regular exam during the allotted time, the final exam will be used as a makeup exam (see below).

<u>Final Exam</u>: There will be one optional **comprehensive** final exam following the same format as the regular exams and given during final exams week (see course outline and/or final exam schedule on the LBCC website). If you miss a regular exam due to illness or unforeseen circumstance, the final exam will replace the missing score. If you have taken all the regular exams, the final exam can be used to replace a low exam score OR you can opt out of the final exam if you have taken all three regular exams and are happy with your grade.

<u>Research Proposal</u>: You will be required to write one paper, which will serve as a research proposal and will be worth 20% of your final grade. For this paper, you will design an experiment in the area of Social Psychology, complete a literature review, state a hypothesis and complete a methods section as if you were a researcher who was going to collect the actual data. Your proposal must be written in APA style. We will have several deadlines for this project as we go through the term and you can access more detailed information regarding the requirements of this assignment at the Canvas site. The assignments related to your research proposal may be turned in late, but there will be a 10% deduction for each day they are late (this includes the research proposal itself).

<u>Activities</u>: We will also be conducting 10 activities worth 15% of your final grade over the course of the term. Instructions for each activity are at the Canvas site. Activities MUST be typed, double-spaced and submitted to the Canvas site by class time on the day they are due. IN ADDITION, in order to get full credit for this activity, you MUST have either a printed copy of your completed activity with you in class or be able to access it through a laptop or tablet (phones do not count). To allow for unforeseen circumstances in which you were unable to complete an activity by the deadline, only 8 of the 10 activities count toward the determination of your final grade.

<u>Grades</u>: Your final grade will be assigned based on the total number of points earned during the course and the weight of each of the assignments. You will be assigned to the letter grade corresponding to your % of total points according to the table below:
