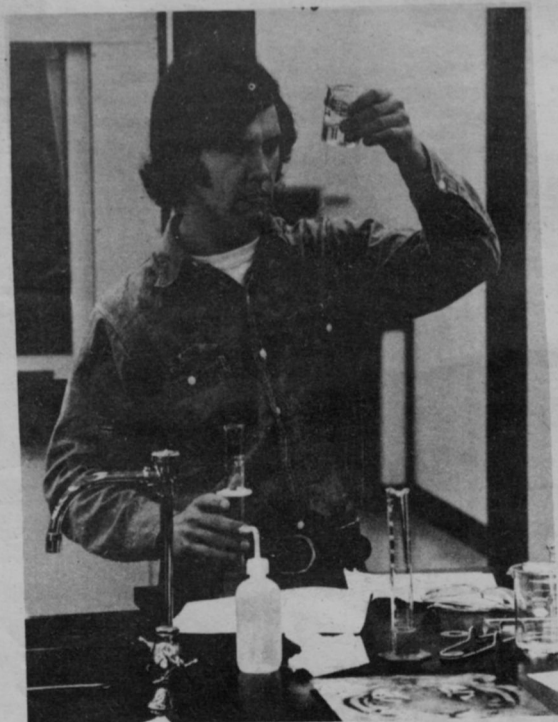
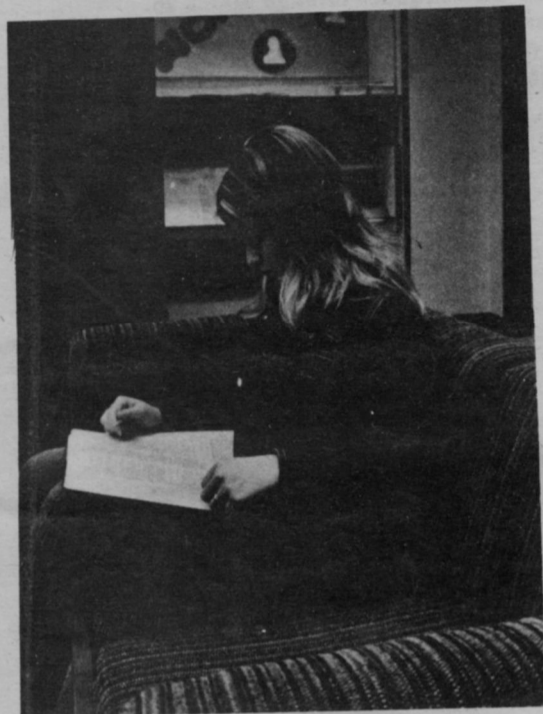

# Regular Credit Classes

## Registration Information

Registration begins March 1 and continues through March 26. Registration Office hours are 8:30 am to 4:30 pm Monday through Friday. March 29 through April 1 the Registration Office will be open from 8:00 am to 8:30 pm Monday through Thursday



### Registration Information for Students Taking 8 or More Credit Hours

#### Steps to be taken before you stand in line to register:

- 1. Admission** - Students planning to enroll for 8 or more credit hours: File an Application for Admission; file transcripts from previous schools attended; make arrangements to take the Comparative Guidance and Placement Test (CGP)
- 2. Advising** - New students enrolling for 8 or more credit hours will receive advising help during the advising/registration period planned for new students. New students who have completed the admissions process will be assigned a date for advising by the Admissions Office. **Continuing** students may plan their own programs and register without staff approval. If assistance is necessary, contact a faculty advisor or the Guidance Center.
- 3. Program Approval** - All NEW students must secure counselor approval (CC-110) of their program.
- 4. Graduation Requirements** - Students expecting to receive an Associate Degree or departmental certificate from LBCC must apply for graduation in the Admissions and Career Information Center one term prior to graduation.
- 5. Registration** - Pick up a long-form registration packet in the registration area. Check for posted lists of filled, cancelled, added, or changed classes. fully complete each form in ballpoint pen. Make sure all copies are legible.

All continuing students in the following special programs will be required to register prior to the last day of the preceding term to assure their place in the program. Space remaining in the program after the last day of the term will be opened to new students.

- 6. Tuition and Fees** - Full tuition payment is usually necessary at the time of registration. Insurance premiums should also be paid if insurance is desired.

Students sponsored by a special program or attending under a grant or scholarship must pick up an authorization at the Financial Aids Office BEFORE REGISTERING.

The Deferred Payment Plan may be used by full-time students (12 or more credit hours). One third of the tuition is paid at the time of registration and the balance by the end of the fifth week of class. Application for this plan must be made at the Financial Aids Office (CC-107) BEFORE REGISTERING, and a Deferred Payment Agreement must be presented at the time of registration.

- 7. Veteran's benefits and special programs** - Students receiving benefits (GI Bill, Veteran's Vocational Rehabilitation, Veteran's Dependent, or Social Security) have the responsibility of starting the necessary paper work each term in order to receive these benefits. Complete the form in the registration packet and carefully follow the printed instructions. Contact the Veteran's Clerk in the Veteran's Office (CC-121) if you have questions.

### Registration Information for Students Taking 7 or Less Credit Hours

Register during the pre-registration period or during the first three weeks of classes.

Enrolling in day classes the second week requires the instructor's written permission.

Enrolling the third week in any class requires the instructor's written permission and a \$1.00 late fee.

#### Steps to be taken before you stand in line to register:

- 1. Admission** - There are no admission requirements for students taking 7 or fewer credit hours.
- 2. Program approval** - Counselor approval is not required. However, counselors are available to assist students if desired.
- 3. Registration** - Pick up a short-form registration packet in the registration area. Check for posted lists of filled, cancelled, added, or changed classes. fully complete each form in ballpoint pen. Make sure all copies are legible.
- 4. Tuition and Fees** - Full tuition must be paid at the time of registration.
- 5. Veteran's benefits and special programs** - Students receiving benefits (GI Bill, Veteran's Vocational Rehabilitation, Veteran's Dependent, or Social Security) have the responsibility of starting necessary paper work each term in order to receive these benefits. Complete the form in the registration packet and carefully follow the printed instructions. Contact the Veteran's Clerk in the Veteran's Office CC-121 if you have any questions.

### Golden Age Club

Senior citizens (65 years and older) may wish to acquire an LBCC Golden Age Card. The bearer of the card is granted tuition and fee waivers to most college classes on a space available basis, and all college activities. The cards are available in the Community Education Office.

### Insurance

Hospitalization and accident insurance is available to all students at the time of registration. Brochures giving details of this coverage are available in the Registration Office. Premium must be paid at the time of registration or prior to the fourth week of the term.

OCCUPATIONAL-TECHNICAL PROGRAMS

**Adding Classes**

To add a class, an add slip must be presented at the Registration Office and any additional tuition paid. Students taking 8 or more credit hours may add classes through the first week on a space-available basis. Students carrying a total of 7 or less credit hours may add classes during the first two weeks on a space-available basis. However, adding classes during the second week requires written permission of the instructor. There is no add fee for the first change of schedule involving one or more added classes. The charge for each additional change is \$2.

**Dropping Classes**

To officially drop a class requires presentation of a drop slip at the Registrar's Office. Students who withdraw without giving written notice to the Registration Office will forfeit all claims to refund of tuition and will remain responsible for their grade in the class. Students who withdraw from all their classes must also complete a "Total Drop Form" at the Registrar's Office.

**Class Attendance**

Class attendance is most important to the learning process. Students are expected to attend each class meeting for which they have registered. When absence for some unavoidable reason does occur, it is the obligation of the student to contact the instructor to determine if make-up work is possible and the amount.

**Non Attendance**

A "Non-Attendance" instructor withdrawal may be issued by an instructor to students who do not attend class for a two week period and have not made previous arrangements.

**Pass Grading**

Certain courses listed in the schedule have an "OPT" designation in the PNP column. Each student in that class has the option of taking the course for the usual A, B, C, D, or F grade or taking it on a pass/no pass basis. On these courses only, the student may request a P/NP Option Form from the instructor any time during the quarter up to the last day of regular classes. Once the P/NP has been elected, the student may not change back to regular grading without the permission of the instructor. If uncertain about requesting the P/NP, the student should wait until the last day to make a decision.

Courses listed in the schedule with "PNP" in that column are those where only pass or no pass grades are issued.

The maximum of "P" credits allowed toward an LBCC degree will be 16 hours, not including those with mandatory pass (P) grading. Students should consult with a counselor before deciding to choose the pass (P) grade. It is not advisable for a student to choose the "P" grade in a course that is considered a major course in his field of study. Students planning to transfer to a four-year institution should check that institution's requirements regarding the "P."

**Refunds**

To receive a refund, students must submit a drop slip to the Registration Office within the first five weeks of the term. Refunds will be mailed after the second week of classes.

The amount of refund:  
Official withdrawal by a student carrying 8 or more credits=full refund less \$15

Official withdrawal by a student carrying 7 or less credits=full refund less \$5

Official withdrawal by a student paying \$8.75 or enrolled in Community Education non-credit classes=full refund less \$2.50

Reduction of credit load=difference in tuition amounts (to the minimum charge)

Classes cancelled by the college=full refund or re-enrollment in another class providing student notifies Registration Office.

**Records Information**

**In accordance with the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act:** Linn-Benton Community College considers the following to be directory information and releasable to anyone upon request: student's name, address, telephone listing, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, school or division of enrollment, degrees and awards received.

Students who do not wish to have any of the information listed above released by the College must complete a directory deletion form in the Registrar's Office.

**Guidance & Counseling**

The following students are required to have counselor approval of their programs:

1. New students who are registering for 8 or more credit hours.
2. Students being sponsored by a special program, such as DVR, etc.
3. Students on probation or in danger of failure.
4. Students changing their majors.

In addition, any student who wishes counseling assistance in planning his program is encouraged to contact a faculty advisor or the Guidance Center for an appointment.

**LBCC Credit By Examination**

If presently enrolled students believe they have mastered the material presented in a certain course offered at LBCC or have had equivalent work experience, they may request credit by examination ("challenge"). This may be accomplished by: (1) enrolling in the class and presenting a request directly to the instructor (without additional cost if a full-time student), or (2) apply at the Registrar's Office and pay a \$3.00 per credit hour fee. ### COMMUNITY EDUCATION REGISTRATION INFORMATION

REGISTRATION for Community Education Classes may take place before classes begin or the first class meeting. However, space is limited in some classes and pre-registered students will be given preference over persons who wait for first class meeting to register.

TUITION for credit classes is charged at the rate of \$8.75 per credit hour for in-district residents. Tuition for non-credit classes is based on the number of hours an instructor is furnished. Tuition is higher for hobby and recreational courses than for other classes since they must be self-supporting. See class schedule for specific rates.

In-district residents, Linn and Benton counties, may take classes at any center for the resident tuition charge. Out-of-district residents may be required to pay a higher amount.

**MINIMUM CLASS SIZE:** To insure that classes are economical, a minimum of 12 persons must enroll for a class to be held as scheduled. If a class is cancelled students may transfer to another class or have tuition and fees refunded.

Some classes have severe space limitations and are identified in this schedule by the words "Enrollment Limited". To obtain space in these classes it is important that you register early at the Center under which the class is listed.

For pre-registration call or visit your community education center.

**NEW CLASSES** - If 12 or more persons are interested in a new course, the Community Education Division will try to locate a qualified instructor and suitable facilities. Contact your Community Education Center if you have a course you would like to take or are qualified to teach.

**LATE FEE:** A \$1.00 late fee is required of students enrolling in the third or later week of class. Normally the college registrar will not accept registrations after the third week of a scheduled class.

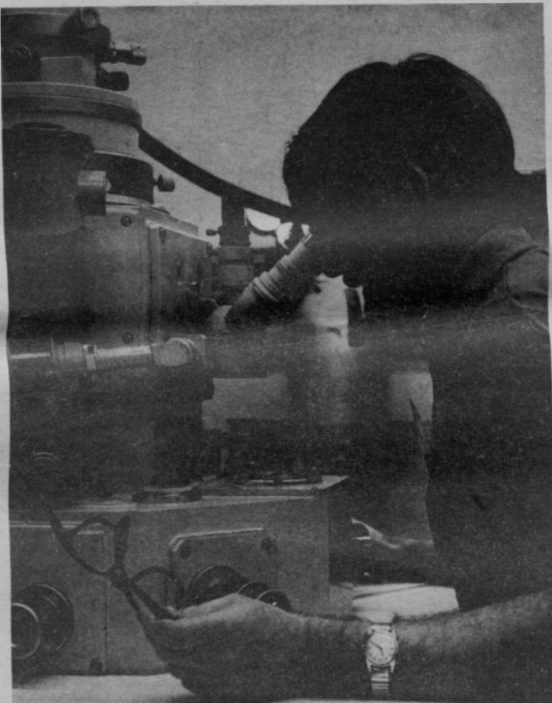

Linn-Benton Community College is a comprehensive community college offering a variety of vocational, academic and continuing education programs.

The college has approximately 30 career programs related to local area job opportunities. The majority of the programs offer educational opportunities for people who are presently working in these fields to upgrade their skills as well as providing initial training to those entering the job markets for the first time.

In order to provide for students who wish to go on to one of the four-year colleges or universities LBCC has an academic program which enables students to begin their studies with the advantages of small classes, special learning aids and remedial programs for basic college preparation.

Special programs like the ABE-GED (Adult Basic Education and General Education Development) offer help to adults and students of all backgrounds and ages for improving their basic skills in reading, writing, math and study methods without tuition, through aid from federal funds.

Even though recreation and hobby courses are not high on the college's priority list it is believed that their existence on a self-supportive basis is an important community service. The community benefits through the use of the college's facilities and buildings to the fullest capacity, and these courses supplied in response to the community's demand enrich thousands of lives. Wherever citizens can guarantee an enrollment of 12 students paying the fee the college will provide a course requested if at all possible. The minimum of 12 students will guarantee a self-supporting class.

LBCC is attempting to retain its open-door policy, unrestricted admission to all adults, and at the same time provide low cost education. However, in attempting both of these goals the college is required to develop an efficient operation in order to keep the tax rate as low as possible for the community.

There are ten centers operating throughout the area the college serves to provide contact service with the community and ensure that local needs are being met.

The LBCC Board of Education and the college administration desire that citizens in every area of the college's community express their educational needs and wishes. The college belongs to the citizens of Linn and Benton counties and will remain responsive to their post-secondary education needs.

**Agriculture**

**Beekeeping II** - The successful management of honey bees, including hive construction, protective clothing, pollination, queen production. Students will work with bee colonies established on campus.

**Tractor Safety** - The safe operation of farm tractors in accordance with safety regulations and general safe practices. Course is designed to meet the needs of farm workers age 14 and over who need a safety course before receiving a tractor operation permit from Oregon Bureau of Labor.

**Farm Machine Safety** - Same as Tractor Safety, except covers farm machinery. Prerequisite: Satisfactory completion of Tractor Safety.

**Landscape Gardening** - Survey and applications of basic home landscaping principles through lecture and student design problems.

**Hoof Care** - The trimming and care of hooves, their anatomical structure, nailing of shoes in emergencies. Including lab practice. Designed for persons who own and/or care for horses.

**Horse Husbandry, Intermediate** - Selection and care of the horse, including health, nutrition, reproduction, housing; use of the horse including safety, training, performance, equipment; review of literature.

**This Week In Your Garden** - Meets every other week during spring term, course covers practical skills and activities for the home gardeners. Local variables of climate, garden pests, etc., are covered in each class session.

**Livestock Care / Management** - The course deals with the general practices related to feeding, care, selection and management of livestock.

**Business**

**Real Estate License Preparation** - Prepares students for Oregon Real Estate Sales Licensing Examination through coverage of basic principles of real estate sales.

**Modern Trends in Real Estate** - A course for practicing real estate sales people. Covers financing, zoning, and ordinances, and taxation of real property.

**Personal Development** - This course is designed to build your self-confidence. Work with walking, standing, sitting, make-up, hair, etiquette, wardrobe, and white collar worker.

**Career Decision Making** - A class to help students define a career, develop personal awareness, practice a decision making process, and learn job-search skills. The students involvement in class activities will be based on his/her own life situations. AC

**Industrial Safety II** - This course covers specific areas of industrial safety including plant inspection, accident investigation, maintenance, material handling, hand tools, electrical hazards, machine guarding, falls, fire prevention, and personal protective equipment. LC

**Principles of Salesmanship** - An introductory course on the subject of business from the viewpoint of the sales-oriented firm. Included is discussion of the characteristics of the customer, his buying motives and approach, presentation, demonstration and overcoming objectives in closing the sale. Emphasis will also be placed on advertising, pre-selling techniques, as well as the various media, copy, illustration and layout. LC

**Psychology for Supervisors** - A course to assist the supervisor in understanding the people with whom he works with emphasis on the psychological aspects, perceptions, learning processes, emotions, attitudes and personalities. LC

**Home & Family Living**

**Menswear** - Demonstration, construction and fitting of men's slacks, shirts, sport coats and accessories from knit fabrics. BC

**Microwave Cookery** - Techniques and procedures in the use of microwave ovens and background in mechanics. Includes timing and preparing meals with recipes suited to microwave ovens. Preregistration required. AC

**Patchwork & Quilting** - Piecing, construction and quilting skills emphasizing new ideas and time-saving techniques. Uses for patchwork other than quilts is included. AC, BC, LC, SHC

**Planning Ahead for Retirement** - Economics, housing, legal concerns, recreation, health and aging, human relations, transportations, mental attitudes and other topics of retirement planning. Ideal for couples. AC

**Sew for Camping and Backpacking** - Includes demonstration & construction of backpacks, cante packs, saddle bags, sleeping bags, and rainwear, tents, etc. BC

**Sewing Unlimited** - An open lab class where the student can sew and receive specific help with any techniques or skills they desire. AC, BC

**Sweat Clothes** - Short course in making mens and womens sports wear suitable for jogging, warm ups, and other similar activities. AC, BC, CL

**Sourdough Bread Baking** - Pioneer tradition of sourdough cookery. Includes history, many exciting recipes, and ways to save the starter. AC, BC, SHC

**Wild & Edible Plants** - Will include identification and preparation of local edible plants and mushrooms, including field trips to identify their natural habitat. AC, LC

**Sew With Knits** - A class in advanced techniques for sewing on knit fabrics. Emphasis on pattern selection, fabric content, and how to handle materials; fitting and finishing the construction of a professional garment. AC, BC, LC, SHC

**Custom Drapes** - How to measure windows, figure materials and make professional appearing drapes.

**Entertain With A Flair - Using Small Equipment** - Cooking with style and flair for family entertaining using a combination of conventional range, microwave oven and small appliances such as blender, electric pot, ect. Demonstration and tasting of complete meal each session.

**Flower Arranging** - Art of floral design and arrangements using natural or artificial flowers, fruits, etc.

**Food Drying** - Learning the process of preparing, drying, storing and using dehydrated food (mainly fruits and vegetables).

**French Cooking I** - Basics of the art of French cooking including class participation in the preparation of many dishes.

**Investment and Insurance** - Basic principals of financial management. Building your financial goals. Study of compounding profits, life insurance, investments - including stocks, bonds, and real estate -income tax and estate planning.

**Lingerie** - Construction of : bra, girdle, panties, slip, gown and peignoir, slippers and trim.

**Machine Embroidery** - Basics of machine embroidery, stitches and how to use them, appliques, monograms, edge finishes, and yarn stitchery. Only requires a zig-zag machine - no other special attachment.

**Make Your Own Patterns** - 10 week course covers basic techniques in fitting and making individualized patterns. Students can design and construct garments, adapt commercial patterns and achieve better fit.

## Human Relations

**Assertiveness Training** - A class to facilitate the learning of a package of communication skills termed assertive training.

**I'm OK, You're OK** - Examines our three personality parts - parent, adult, and child. By understanding our ego states we come to understand who we are , why we act as we do and helps us understand our thoughts, feelings and behaviors.

**Applied Transactional Analysis** - A continuation of the I'm OK You're OK course.

**I'm OK, You're OK Workshop** - Covers the concepts and principles of I'm OK, You're OK above, but at a more rapid pace and in a retreat atmosphere. Recommended for couples.

## Math Science

**Scientific Glass Blowing** - An introductory course for persons interested in scientific glass blowing. Topics will include a discussion of the properties of glasses, working with glass tubing and making glass-metal seals.

**FCC License Preparation** - To present and teach FCC rules and Regulations; Fcc Commercial & Amateur exam testing procedures through the use of the FCC rules, typical FCC exam questions and answers, radio and TV terms and definitions, and in general prepares the student for taking the FCC exams.

## Recreation

**Oriental Dance [Belly-Dance, Mid-East Dance]** - An ancient ritual dance developed by Mediterranean civilizations 6,000 years ago. Instruction covers the exercises and dance steps. Excellent for muscle tone, posture, weight control.

**Ballroom Dancing** - Are you a nostalgia buff or do you just enjoy great recreation? The Swing, Fox Trot, Waltz, and Rhumba will be taught Friday evenings. Come join the fun.

**Pocket Billiards** - Uses video tape and other teaching techniques to improve students manual dexterity and basic skills. For beginning, intermediate and advanced players.

**Vacation at Home** - Will cover the recreational possibilities; vacation areas available; camping sites and facilities; laws, regulations, permits and fees in Linn and Benton Counties as is applicable. Considerable time will be spent during the first and last classes going over and outlining the recreational possibilities to be found in these counties.

## Art

**Photography** - Covers black and white photography: Cameras, film developing, printing negatives, enlarging, lighting. On Albany campus advanced students will work with color developing and enlarging.

**Tole Painting** - Fundamentals of tole or decorative painting, preparing boards or metal items for painting, transferring designs, painting designs, antiquing and finishing.

**Calligraphy** - Calligraphy and lettering systems, skill and discretion in applying lettering. Instruction in abasic lettering system, supplementary forms of lettering, pens, inks, and papers.

**AC** **Beginning Crafts for the Handicapped** - Basketry, pottery, macrame and  
**BC** candlemaking.

**AC** **Crafts for the Blind** - Working with leather, clay, wood, weaving, rug making,  
**SHC** stuffed animals, tools and pillows. Other possibilities will be considered as suggestions are made.

**BC** **Woodcarving** - Covers tools, techniques, wood selection, design. Students  
select projects for work in classroom.

**AC** **Color and Abstract Painting** - Use of oil or acrylic with emphasis on color.  
Covers fundamental concepts of color, line, form, texture, and space.

## BC Parent/Child Education

**AC** **Behavior Modification Workshop for Parents** - Designed to use the didactic  
approach, discussion, and practice wherein parents learn to pinpoint one or two problem behaviors, take baselines, and then introduce change techniques. Progress is charted and reported for feedback (corrective and/or supportive).

**BC** **Understanding Children I** -Designed to help adults understand and alter  
**SHC** children's behavior, utilize new ways of dealing with conflicts, and gain ideas for nuturing responsible children.

**LC** **Understanding Children II** - Expands upon the concept taught in the first  
quarter with an emphasis on the child's emotional growth, effective communication skills, approaches to problems at school, and the family meeting as aides to raising a responsible child.

**AC** **You and Your Teen** - A look at effective parenthood for the teen years  
**SHC** stressing communication skills. Participants will practice dealing with common problems and learn to understand the adolescent development process in order to help their teens prepare for adult life.

**AC** **Crafts with Children** - A class in which students will experience a wide variety  
**CL** of arts and crafts techniques to use with children. One section appropriate for  
**BC** the adult working with children 5 - 13, and another for the preschooler.  
**LC**

## PE & Health

**AC** **Women's Health Tools** - Learning aides to getting healthy and staying that  
**LC** way! These include deep relaxation, exercise, nutrition, Swedish massage, knowledge of anatomy, Hatha Yoga, and most important of all, awareness of one's own state of health.

**AC** **Wilderness Survival** - To instruct the student in all aspects of outdoor Survival  
Training. The many definitions of Survival. The need for survival training, primitive, and survival.

**BC** **Kundalini Yoga - The Yoga of Awareness** - The excercises used in Kundalini  
**LC** Yoga which combine physical posture, breathing exercises, mind control and the science of Humanalogy will be taught. Students will learn how to increase their energy, relax deeply, and increase their level of awareness.

## Self Improvement

**AC** **Personal Assessment and Career Exploration** - Teaches methods of career  
**SHC** selection emphasizing vocational development as an ongoing process.

**AC** **Driver Education** - Classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction for persons  
who are preparing for a motor vehicles operator's license.

**AC** **ABE** - Adult Basic Education for persons 16 and older who have not finished  
grade or high school. Covers reading, english and math courses. Available free through a State of Oregon Grant to the college.

**AC** **GED** - Preparation for adult high school equivalency tests for persons 16 and  
older not currently enrolled in high school. Covers English, math, reading, literature, Natural Science, and Social Science. Available free through a State of Oregon grant to the college.

**AC** **High School Completion** - For those adults who wish to obtain a regular high  
school diploma which can be issued by the college, or by a local high school.

## Special Interest

**AC** **Skeetshooting** - Improve your shooting under the guidance of an experienced  
instructor. Shotguns available at range, or bring your own.

**AC** **Know your Antiques** - Have you wondered if your favorite ring or chair is a  
**BC** collectable or an antique ? Know your antiques will teach you to recognize  
**LC** and appraise the value of glass, ceramics, primitive metals, and jewelry.  
**SHC** Demonstration pieces will be presented and students may bring their own pieces for class consideration.

**AC** **Winemaking** - If the process for creating ambrosia escapes you, this can help.  
**BC** Winemaking will introduce you to the types of wines, the equipment,  
**SHC** firmentation process, racking, bottles and storage.

Additional Benton Center Descriptions

**Techniques of Stock Market Analysis**—Through lecture and discussion on the basic facts one should know before investing capital in today's stock and bond markets, students will learn how to avoid investment pitfalls and how the professionals take advantage of business cycles and trends to make money.

**Your Attitude is Showing**—Reading, studying and discussing the book, "Your Attitude is Showing" will give people of all ages, young and old alike, greater confidence to deal with many human relations problems. It will provide a philosophy, a set of principles and guidelines to follow in dealing with human problems, thus eliminating many mistakes and frustrations. It will show in a sensitive way why the student's positive attitude is vital to his career success and how he can protect and develop it.

**Painting Mixed Media**—Instruction in the use of painting medias; oil, watercolor, with special emphasis on the development of composition and realism techniques. Students may pursue interests in landscape, portraiture, or other subject matter using photography, live objects, or pure imagination.

**French for Travelers**—A course designed primarily for travelers, concentrating on the phrases and conversation needed by travelers visiting French-speaking countries who have little or no knowledge of the French language.

**Italian Cooking I**—Learn the basic of Italian Cooking, including making noodles, tomato sauce, different spaghetti sauces, Lasagna, Ravioli, and authentic Italian pizza. Other more elegant Italian dishes will also be prepared.

**Clock Cabinetmaking**—This course is designed to instruct and encourage the art of fine clock cabinetmaking. This course will include wood carving, veneering, specialized finishes, selection and installation of clock movements, and the pros and cons of different movements.

**Metalcraft/Enameling**—A very ancient art that has been known since the Fifth Century B.C. The process involves applying a thin coat of glass to metal, then heating it to about 1500° to fuse the glass to the metal piece.

**Elements of Supervision**—A basic introductory course covering in general terms the total responsibilities of a supervisor in industry, such as organization, duties and responsibilities, human relations, grievance, training, rating, promotion, quality-quantity control, and management-employee relations.

**Livestock Breeding**—This course is designed to provide the student with instruction in the areas of the reproductive systems, hormones, artificial insemination, livestock breeding, inheritance and basic genetic systems. Students will also become familiar with different systems of breeding animals and improving them through inherited traits.

**Introduction to Mushroom Identification**—A general introduction to poisonous and edible mushrooms and their relatives, with emphasis on identification of common and local species. This course will provide information on some conspicuous fungal organisms occurring in nature and opportunity to extend this knowledge according to individual interest.

**Aging in America**—An interdisciplinary look at the aging process and the position of the aged in our society. Current issues in psychology, health, economics and community involvement as they pertain to the aged will be discussed. Movies, simulation games, and guest speakers will be used to increase awareness and understanding of the older person. This course is designed to be both an informative and an effective experience.

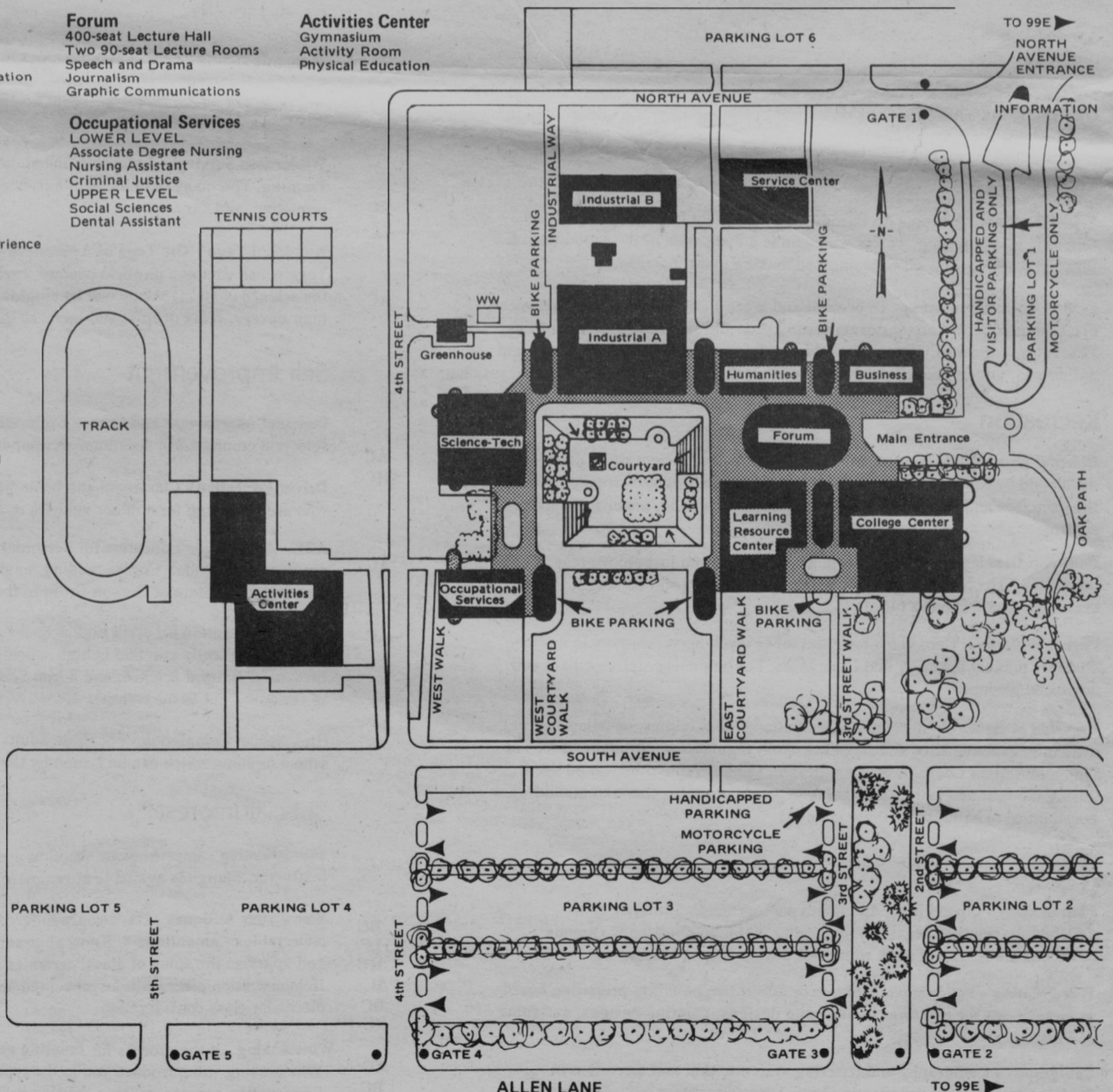
