## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

Anthropology has been defined as the study of human beings both past and present. It "...seeks to produce useful generalizations about people and their behavior and to arrive at the fullest possible understanding of human diversity." This course intends to introduce students to the study of that part of anthropology concerned with culture, it's methods, subject matters, and findings. By the end of the term students should have a general understanding of the range of topics which cultural anthropologists investigate and the means by which they study them, as well as an appreciation for the variety of beliefs and behaviors that human beings have exhibited through time and space.

#### **COURSE FORMAT:**

The course is structured in a lecture-discussion format. Through readings in the text, occassional videos, instructor lectures, and student discussion the class will (hopefully) come to an understanding of the objectives, perspectives, methods, and findings of cultural anthropologists and anthropology. Towards this end it is imperative that students keep up with the assigned reading and come prepared to participate in class discussions on the readings and/or videos.

### **COURSE TOPICS:**

As an introduction to the practice and study of cultural anthropology the course material will cover the major categories of human behavior, practice, and belief, as well as the concepts and methods by which cultural anthropologists study these. This will include but not be limited to material on the nature of anthropology as a social science, the anthropological concept of culture, how language and culture are interconnected, the major types of subsistence systems human beings use, different forms of marriage and descent found throughout the world, the kinds of political systems human beings have developed, and their religious beliefs and practices.

#### **COURSE GRADES:**

The grade for this course will be determined by the percentage of total points earned out of a possible 353. There will be **four** (4) multiple-choice exams -one exam approx. every two and a half weeks of the term- each worth 45 points for a total of 180 [4\*45]points. In addition, there will also be 3 short (5 page) take-home essays worth 40 points each for a total of 120 [3\*40] points. In addition, students will also earn 1.77 points for each class session attended, with attendance comprising approx. 15% of total course grade, or 53 [1.77\*30]points total for attendance. A letter grade will be given for each exam. The final grade for the term will be based upon the students percentage of accumulated points earned for attendance, essays and exams over the term. Exams and essay topics will be posted on the instructor's website every Friday. Exams will be due the following Monday, and essays the following Friday. Letter grades will be given according to the following schedule:
