TUITION INCREASES

The LBCC Board approved tuition increases for the 1971-72 school year beginning summer quarter. LBCC has not increased tuition for credit classes since its beginning in 1967. The increase is \$1.00 per credit hour for in-district students. (The Adult Education fee has gone from \$12.00 to \$14.00.) However, even with the increase of \$12.00 for full-time attendance, the total rate of \$84.00 for tuition and fees will be low as compared with other community colleges. (Any Questions? The purpose of the meeting will be to inspect LBCC's chemistry facilities and plans for the new building. They also will be discussing instrumentation of chemistry classes suitable for LBCC, and the articulation of an organic chemistry sequence to better fit with those of the 4-year institutions.

UPPER DIVISION SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

For Black Americans, Mexican Americans, Puerto Ricans, and American Indians. This is a new Ford Foundation program of financial aid for selected minority group students who have taken a transfer program at a two-year institution and will be completing it at the end of spring or summer term, 1971. The scholarship will partially pay expenses for 1 year at a four-year institution (from 20% to 80% based upon the need of the winner) and may be renewed for students making satisfactory progress.
