On Jan. 20, 1961, the newly sworn in 35th President of the United States, John F. Kennedy spoke the following words:

"And so, my fellow Americans: ask not what your country can do for you - ask what you can do for your country."

Students all over the nation recite this speech in classes, and these words have found themselves ingrained within modern American consciousness. Along with "We hold these truths to be selfevident..." and "four scores and seven years ago..." each invoke the strong sense of commodore and patriotism that built this nation up from nothing more than an idea of enlightened thinkers in dark times.

They seem to resonate most strongly during times of political and civil unrest, as Kennedy knew when he spoke at his inauguration during the continued struggles of the civil rights movement, the ongoing Vietnam War, and the growing tension of the increasingly nuclear-fueled Cold War.

Now as we enter into the fray of primaries and election battles, we as citizens now hold the power to step forward, and shape our nation in ever-chang-

For LBCC's Democracy in Action Club, led by History instructor, Dr. Robert Harrison, there will be many opportunities for students and members of the LBCC community to become engaged in the role of civic participation.

During the course of 2012, students at LBCC will be given the chance to not only learn about the history of the democratic process, but also to participate in ways not just voting, but how they can be advocates for the changes they wish to see take place.

The Democracy Club has put together many events spaced throughout the year, from a speech and panel by noted Historian, Harvey J. Kaye, on "Thomas Paine: the Unfinished American Revolution" on Feb. 21 from 12-1 p.m. in Forum 104, to discussions of the role of Media (traditional and social) in the modern political process.

For students who are interested in political activism, there were also be a opportunity through the 'Liberty Tree Fair' in April to connect with various groups representing the diverse political spectrum, and find ways to add their voice to civil political discourse.

As Club Advisor, Professor Harrison said:

"I want the students to remember that this election, and also in the years between elections, that they need to be active citizens, and that means voting. It also means being an educated voter. It means getting involved;

petitioning the government, whether it is state or federal, and contacting your state and local representatives to let them know how you feel. I want students to think of citizenship in this broad sense of how they must be responsible for the quality of

Meeting to Discuss Funding; Why You Should Care

If you have concerns about whether or not tuition will be going up or how community colleges, such as Linn-Benton are funded, there is a special event next week in Salem that would be worth attending. Student representatives from the Oregon Community College Student Association (OCCSA) will hold a town meeting for Oregon State Legislators on Feb. 13 in Salem. The hour long meeting will run from 5:30 - 6:30 p.m. with the legislators discussing questions and topics regarding community college funding and those dreaded tuition in-

The panel will be answering questions and have discussions with a moderator and students. The main focus will be on the topic that today's problems need to be solved today and not in the future. The questions to be fielded will be based on pre-selected topics, which were sent to the legislators. Topics include the Oregon Opportunity Grant, tuition increases and the community college support fund. For those unable to attend the meeting, the discussion will be video streamed online and to campuses unable to attend. The OCCSA is encouraging students to attend the meeting, so that they may be empowered and that legislators can hear what you have to say. Because this is such a crucial year when it comes to funding, the OCCSA hopes to be heard en masse. They believe that it is essential for community college students to be

Feb. 14 from 11a.m. to 1 p.m., Albany's Safe Haven Humane Society and Active Minds members will be teaming up, to bring some adoptable dogs to LBCC's Albany campus.

There should be about four guest canines.

Greg Jones, the Active Minds faculty advisor said, "The idea behind this is that single people feel alone around Valentine's Day and being around dogs (and possibly adopting) might improve mental health on campus."

Students are encouraged to come pet the dogs and maybe even fall in love to begin the pet adoption process.

Pet adoption paperwork will be available on-site.

Another campus event will happen the following day. James Phelps, MD, a nationally respected expert in the field of mental health, will be giving a brief presentation on various mental health topics. Phelps has more than 15 publications and hosts his own informational website. He is recognized as one of the highest nationwide experts on the topic of bipolar disorder.

He completed his education at Stanford University, Case Western Reserve University, and residency/fellowship at University of New Mexico.

Phelps will be in LBCC's Tripp Theater in Takena Hall on Wednesday, Feb. 15, from noon to 1 p.m., giving a 45 minute lecture, followed by a 15 minute Q&A session. This presentation is entirely open to the public and is intended to be a resource to anyone interested. Business cards will be handed out, including public and community resources.

Topics to be included in the presentation:

- What to consider when depression doesn't improve.
- How to choose medication/psychotherapy.
- How to choose a therapist.
- What you should know about antidepressants.
- Nine alternatives to medication.

There is also an OSU chapter Active

Minds video screening on Wednesday, Feb. 8 from 6 - 7:30 p.m. of Kay Redfield Jamison's lecture at OSU from last quarter. The topic of this screening is "Depression and Bi-Polar Disorder in Young Adults," which will be followed by a Q&A session with OSU Counseling and Psychological Services clinicians and an OSU staff member with her own personal experience.

The Active Minds club was formed in 2001 by Alison Malmon, the sister of a University of Pennsylvania student, who committed suicide on campus a year and a half after being diagnosed with depression and psychosis.

Her main goal was to provide support to students, and to help reduce the stigma that comes along with being given the title of "mentally ill." The Active Minds Club is highly respected and well-funded, with over 340 campus chapters nation-wide, since its inception in September 2001. The LBCC chapter has been meeting for about a year and is proud to have an active level of involvement.

The next regular LBCC club meeting is Friday, Feb. 10 at noon in Mackenzie Hall 118, gathering every other Friday. Meetings are always open to the general public.

On average, tuition has increased for community colleges statewide by more than 20% and making a college education increasingly unaffordable to lower income students. In addition, the funding for the Oregon Opportunity Grant has decreased which reduces the number of students who can receive need-based aid to offset the rising costs of living or raising a family.

We support the efforts of the OCCSA because funding cuts and tuition increases at Oregon Community Colleges must stop. If costs continue to rise and opportunities continue to become limited then we, as a State, move farther away from maximizing the potential of our students in the workforce, at home, and in life.

Tigard, OR.: Jamal Tarhuni, 55, a naturalized U.S. citizen, was denied boarding a U.S. bound flight at a Tunisia airport Jan. 17, and interrogated by the FBI for reasons he claims he doesn't know. Tarhuni was helping to distribute medicine and supplies in his native country of Libya has been blocked from flying back into the US. Tarhuni flew to Libya three months ago, to personally deliver millions worth of medical supplies donated by Medical Teams International. Tarhuni is now forced to stay with extended family in Tripoli, while he is under investigation. He is only able to communicate with his wife and four kids via Skype. Tarhuni is adamant that he has never spoken to any terrorist groups, and has never done or said anything that goes against the US. His family says he made the trip himself, to ensure the supplies weren't intercepted at the port and sold on the black market.

Australia: Authorities were using military helicopters and a C-130 cargo plane Sunday to evacuate thousands

of residents stranded by rising floodwaters in the eastern Australian state of Queensland. Heavy rains in recent weeks have swollen rivers beyond their banks, threatening a number of communities in Queensland and New South Wales. Authorities were using the plane and helicopters to evacuate patients from a hospital in particularly hard-hit Queensland town of St. George, where officials were warning about 4,000 residents to get out of the path of what officials say will be a record-breaking flood. According to authorities, food and medical supplies have been flown to isolated communities elsewhere in Queensland and rescue workers have already recovered the body of a woman, who died trying to drive her pickup through floodwa-

C: What experience do you have?




C: What do you think will be the most challenging part of your new job?

"He would call me and tell me we need one more year together" Seth said.




Jim Westfall, cofounder of the Door to Grace Organization in Portland, will present statistics on human trafficking and share information on the organization and how communities can get involved.

Door to Grace provides restorative care services and safe shelter for children, who are survivors of commercial sexual exploitation. The presentation helps bring awareness to human exploitation in America, with special focus on Portland and the surrounding areas.

Guest speaker Jessica Richardson, a survivor of human exploitation, will share her story. She was 17, when she was trafficked from Oregon to California to Canada as part of the West Coast sex trade. Now 31 and living in Gresham, she shares her story in an effort to raise awareness about human trafficking.

Freedom Riders on Campus

News Release

Dr. Robert Singleton, one of the original Civil Rights Freedom Riders, is speaking today at Linn-Benton Community College from noon to 1 p.m. in the Forum building, room F-104, 6500 Pacific Blvd. SW, Albany.

Singleton, an economic professor at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angles, will speak of his experiences with the Freedom Ride, being arrested and jailed and what it meant to him then and now. A question and answer session will follow.

In 1960, Singleton was named president of the NAACP chapter at UCLA. He helped to recruit for, and ultimately participated in, the Freedom Riders movement in the south, where the riders set out to challenge Mississippi and other southern states to comply with two U.S. Supreme Court decisions ruling racial segregation unconstitutional in interstate travel.

On July 30, 1961, Singleton, along with more than 300 Freedom Riders, was arrested in Jackson, Mississippi, where the riders were tried, fined and incarcerated at Parchman

Penitentiary.




Lars and Bianca Lars and the Real Girl (2007)





"SoulCaliburV": More of the Same

The "SoulCalibur" series was always impressive, but Namco has yet to recreate what players felt during the early years.

Granted, SoulCalibur games need not be entirely fresh to be enjoyable – but like all things in life, the obvious "lather, rinse, repeat" cycle becomes dull for fans craving more.

Ranked number five on Complex.com's "50 Best Fighting Games of All Time," "SoulCalibur" – following success in the arcades – found a new home on the Sega Dreamcast. The first sequel launched in 2003 on all three major consoles of the generation, followed by two additional chapters and a bombed segue ("SoulCalibur: Legends"). According to VG247.com, the latest, "SoulCalibur 5," was initially announced at a conference in Dubai last May.

But like every other sequel after the second installment, "SoulCalibur 5" gives players what's expected – and that's about it.

The next chapter in a tale "told for all eternity" (and they're not kidding) continues in medieval times, 17 years from the last game. The main protagonist, Patroklos, searches for his lost sister Pyrrha, while attempting to locate an evil "malfested" girl – a demoncically possessed individual – who kidnapped her and killed their mother. Players switch back and forth between character perspectives, revealing experiences from both Patroklos's and Pyrrha's point of view.

Following in the footsteps of its immediate predecessor, "SoulCalibur 5's" offline story only takes away from other quality aspects of the game. The plot is painfully predictable, and the overall fighting routine becomes quickly repetitive, presenting you with limited items to be unlocked. In fact, the only real objective is to reach the next cut-scene, so "SoulCalibur" veterans will probably yearn for the days when there were plenty of missions, collectible items, and the ability to choose your character. This is, however, still an excellent time to experiment with character moves.

When fighting the computer, constant kicking (sadly) goes a long way, even when the difficulty level seems harder. This might have been acceptable in the days of "Mortal Kombat 2," but one would think a computer opponent capable of blocking more complicated moves could deal with repetitive kicks.

"SoulCalibur 5" lacks innovation, but the visual appearances and general mechanics remain golden. For starters, everyone's favorite characters look more realistic than ever. With reoccurring appearances from fan favorites like Nightmare (obviously), Sigfried, Ivy, Astaroth, and Voldo, there are 29 selections total (not counting custom fighter options).

Like previous entries before it, character movements and animation are almost flawless, and feature some of the smoothest graphics ever witnessed in a "SoulCalibur" title. Character move patterns seem similar to their predecessors, placing an emphasis on both classic and modern "SoulCalibur" mechanics. Thankfully, none of the fighters seemed brutally overpowered, which is a minor flaw prominent in the first games.

The second installment to offer online matches, "Soul-Calibur 5" has a sturdy match lobby, allowing for both random pairings and selectable challenges. Spikes in online latency are rare, though unfortunately devastating when present. There's a chance you'll get pinned up against someone greater than you in the first match, but balancing seems to even out after completing more fights.

Though it might sound strange, the most immediate fun in "SoulCalibur 5" involves the character creator. Whether you're looking to construct the babe of your dreams or an ideal macho destroyer, you'll probably spend most time playing with the different equipment types – additional accessories can be unlocked – and physical features.

You'll laugh, cry, and maybe even throw up a bit, because there are some pretty gnarly-looking characters created by others in the "quick match" offline mode.

Overall, exceptional visuals and a sturdy match-up system make "SoulCalibur 5" a reasonable, but all-too-familiar package. Repetition makes the full \$60 price tag of the game difficult (if not impossible) to justify, since most features are already available in "SoulCalibur 4." Like every other relaunch of a popular fighting game, the greatest appeal in "SoulCalibur 5" is how it offers a (technically) fresh battleground for both new and returning players to embrace.

Perhaps someday Namco will recreate what everyone felt in 1998 and 2003. Meanwhile, you could simply rent the newest chapter and create a cleaver-wielding Richard Simmons to fight player X's "generic skimpy school girl," and player Y's "outrageous sumo surprise."



Let me preface this review by saying that I am not a Katherine Heigl fan. I can't exactly say why, but I can't look at the woman without thinking "heinous witch."

That being said, the trailer for "One for the Money," and the fact that I really enjoy the Janet Evanovich book series the film is based on, sucked me in. And I wasn't horribly disappointed ... too much.

Heigl stars as Stephanie Plum, an out-of-work lingerie saleswoman turned bail enforcement agent in New Jersey. Her first case, Joe Morelli (Jason O'Mara), is a falsely-accused cop she went to high school with. (Also, she ran him over with her car when he didn't call her after an ... intimate night together.) Even with bounty hunter lessons from Ranger (Daniel Sunjata), Stephanie gets in a little over her head, while trying to apprehend

There is a lot of humor in Evanovich's books that the movie failed to capture. The best moments are in the trailer, and the rest of the movie is mediocre, though harmless.



Fans of the source material will be disappointed.

I really like the character of Stephanie Plum and, my own personal feelings about the "actress" aside, I don't feel that Heigl did her justice. Stephanie, as much as she wants to be, is not a badass recovery agent. She's smart and resourceful, but lucky more than anything else.

If one day I decided that I wanted to be a bounty hunter, I imagine it'd be something like what happens to

Stephanie. She has no clue what she's doing, keeps her gun in the cookie jar, and gets herself handcuffed to her own shower rod.

Heigl's performance felt forced and, like her New Jersey accent, too heavy-handed, in contrast to O'Mara ("Terra Nova"), which was more natural. There was a lightness in his character. Sherri Shepherd, as Stephanie's informant Lula, also interjects some much-needed humor into the story.


The entire film needed a lighter feeling. Yes, there's crime and guns and death, but it's in a fun way. It's more about the awkwardness and absurdity of how Stephanie gets into the situations she finds herself in than the seriousness of them. The cinematography kept things bright and happy, where the script failed to do so.

"One for the Money" is kinda like a candy bar (that Stephanie would keep in her glove compartment next to her Beretta): a bright shiny wrapper filled with unsubstantial fluff you know isn't good for you. It's a fun movie, and though it doesn't call for any deep thinking, it's not going to kill you either. My advice: watch the trailer and read the book!


