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COURSE DESCRIPTION

A beginning course in the principles of 3-dimensional design. Emphasis will be on design problem-solving in a variety of media. Studio work explores basic elements of space, planes, mass, and texture. Fundamental course for students interested in fashion design, ceramics, sculpture, architecture and other advanced media-oriented courses.

This project based class will ask the student to creatively solve design problems. Each project will be designed around a particular question that the student will work to solve through multiple mediums and in 3-dimensions. Through this process the student will become familiar with basic design vocabulary and design characteristics. A basic understanding of construction will be gained and a sculptural foundation will be established.

Recommended: College level reading and writing skills and ART 115: basic design.

Course Outcomes:

- Apply design vocabulary concepts in written and oral critiques of artistic works
- Differentiate between the nature and technical aspects of media
- Operate tools safely and with environmental awareness

Additionally you will be able to:

- Demonstrate proficiency in critical thinking skills, creative problem solving, and visual thinking through the production of artwork.
- Create works in the 3rd dimension
- Apply the elements of art and principles of design into sculptural form
- Students will be able to analyze 3-D projects and articulate sculptural concepts

TEXTBOOKS/MATERIALS-

No Textbook is required for this course. Class readings will be provided.

A Sketchbook is required for this course. You will be expected to have a sketchbook that is a minimum of 9X12" (you can find this at Michaels for \$6.24)

Materials: You will be asked to create 3-dimensional pieces using a sundry of material that is readily available around your home as well as easily obtainable from an online source. I will provide links to online sources for material procurement before each project as well as specify exactly what you are expected to have to complete each project. Some projects will enable you to choose your material.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

What do I need to do to be successful in this class?

- Engage in the class and your work.
- Communicate regularly. Let me know if you are struggling to understand any assignment, a concept, or having trouble procuring material. I will be regularly checking my email as well as have virtual office hours.

Course Structure:

Because this class is offered fully online this term, you will be expected to be regularly checking your email and our moodle course shell.

We will hold weekly zoom meetings on Monday at 10:00 a.m. This will enable use to check-in, hold discussions, and ask questions.

Each week you will be expected to complete tasks that include readings, videos,, discussions and responses. Larger 3-dimensional sculptures will be assigned and completed at home. You will be required to upload images of your work for critique and grading.

Each week's module will open on Monday morning. You can complete the assignments anytime during that week and sculpture projects will often span multiple weeks.

You are expected to be an active member of this class.
